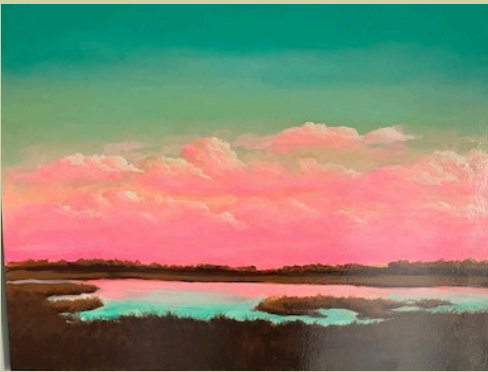
In the spring of 2023, Bryony issued a call for proposals, inviting artists to submit concepts.

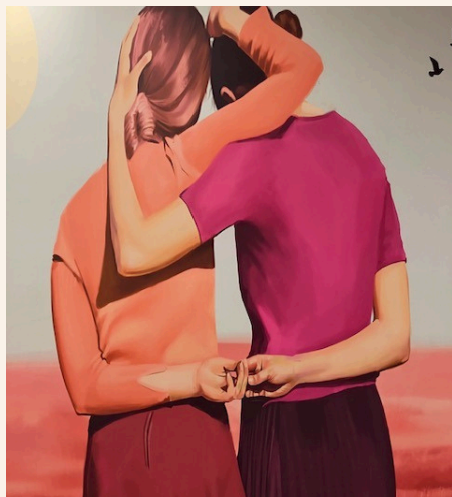

WOMENS COUNSELORS

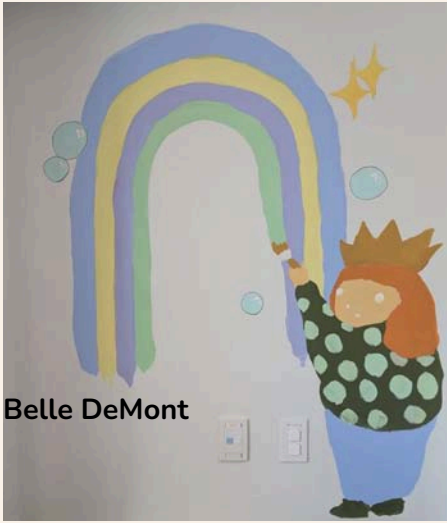
At Bryony House, our Women's Counselors are typically the first point of contact for those who have experienced intimate partner abuse. This contact happens through our crisis lines. Our women's counselors work tirelessly and compassionately to provide 24/7 services such as supportive counseling, resource navigation, safety planning, advocacy, and referrals. This can happen via telephone or on-site within the safety of the shelter.

The women's counselors patiently support each client with whatever their barriers or challenges may be. This past year, we have experienced an increase in admissions of newcomers to Canada. Upon arriving at Bryony House, the assurances by staff that they are in a safe, inclusive, and supportive space, helps those we support sustain a sense of hope.

This past year, the length of stay for our clients has increased to 8-weeks from the previous 6-week limit. The stay may be extended depending on the circumstances that are particular to each client or family. This is in part due to the housing crisis and the challenges that come with finding safe affordable housing. However we are also mindful of the increase in need for service, and our ever growing waitlist. Our staff continually work to allay fears and assist clients in moving forward with things such as child custody, criminal court, child protection, and securing safe housing, to name a few.

Some clients may develop coping strategies to combat the chronic stressors of their situation, while others may be living with, or have developed, anxiety, depression, or other mental health diagnoses as a result of previous trauma, combined with the impacts of abuse and violence. Our knowledgeable women's counselors offer compassionate support using a trauma-informed lens while working under the auspices of harm reduction.

The dedicated women's counselors at Bryony House work tirelessly each day to support those who access our services and make a lasting impacts in the lives of those affected by intimate partner violence.



CHILD CARE TEAM

When children leave their home because of abuse, it is incredibly stressful. This change can create an increase in anxiety, fear, and uncertainty, as they see their parent in distress. Arriving at Bryony House, and being surrounded by strangers can be very scary. Shortly after arrival, the children will meet the Child Care Counselors and be introduced to our amazing playroom or teen lounge. This creates the opportunity for the children to have a moment of fun and curiosity.

The childcare counselors create a safe space for the children to decompress, process, and feel their feelings. The staff's support to the children throughout their stay centers on fostering a fun, creative environment in which the children can play. This comfort and safety can help facilitate the expression of feelings, asking questions, or the sharing of stories.

Our Child Care Counselors recognize the many challenges that children face and address them in a non-intrusive, child-led fashion. This allows the children to have some control over their environment, perhaps in ways that they haven't experienced before, or in a long time. Our Child Care Counselors are committed to helping the families navigate their stay at Bryony House so that eventually they will leave the shelter with a renewed sense of hope, strength, and connection to one another.



COUNSELLING SUPERVISORS

We have been very excited to assume our new roles as Counseling Supervisors since December 2023. The past seven months have provided abundant opportunities for growth and learning through collaboration and training, enriching the skills and knowledge of our frontline Women's Counselors and Child Care Counselors, as well as our own.

Our roles are both rewarding and challenging as we support, brainstorm, and problem-solve with our exceptional teams, whose dedication to our clients is exemplary and unwavering.

Navigating through a trauma-informed lens, with a client-centered approach, and under the auspices of harm reduction, keeps us actively engaged with each other and our clients. We purposefully navigate through a multitude of situations and crises. From children grappling with terrifying suicidal ideation stemming from trauma, upheaval, and uncertainty, to families seeking a place of safety and support amidst challenges like immigration and systemic failings that displace many from their homes, emotions vary widely at any given time. Our staff work diligently and perform commendably to assuage fears, validate feelings and experiences, and educate and support all of our clients in a meaningful and strengths-based manner.

Given the vast knowledge, experience, and expertise of the Bryony House collective, we are committed to forging ahead. We will continue to educate and support those we serve, ensuring their safety as they transition to lives free of abuse.

OUTREACH SUPPORT



The Outreach and Housing program continues to support in-house residents, clients who have recently moved out, or clients who have called the crisis line and are in need of support, but not immediate shelter. For current residents, support looks like planning for next steps- Income Assistance referrals, subsidy applications, December 6 Fund and other forms of financial independence, such as simply opening new bank accounts.

The biggest challenge continues to be affordable housing options. There are active community partnerships, such as Alice House, Tawaak Housing, AHANS which have provided clients with second stage housing options, however, there continues to be a large gap in housing options for families and individuals leaving intimate partner violence.

Many outreach clients are involved in family court and support is given throughout each stage- from retaining a lawyer or applying for Legal Aid, help with submitting court forms, referrals, and legal system navigation. There are a number of clients who represent themselves and rely on the FLIP Centre and Family Law Nova Scotia. Clients are made aware at intake, and during appointments that Bryony House does not offer legal advice.

A growing number of clients experience barriers with Immigration status and processing times. Outreach provides support with language barriers, legal system navigation, community referrals and assistance with printing and filling out immigration applications. There is a TRP option for victims of Domestic Violence in Canada, but many clients find they are not eligible. Community referrals and support often require Permanent Residency or Refugee status.

A recent success of the program has been the development of the outreach pantry. As the need for food security continues to grow once clients have secured housing, the outreach pantry allows clients to supplement their grocery bill and stock up on staples at the same time as receiving counselling and ongoing support.

HOUSING SUPPORT

This past year has brought about both challenges and highlights. Navigating a housing crisis means clients are staying in shelter longer than they would have historically. And although limited housing resources contributes to this, it is also the access to the financial means to be able to secure a space. A client may be able to afford the rent, however doesn't have enough for a damage deposit. This, unfortunately has become the experience of most and creates additional barriers in an already challenging situation.

The rising cost of food deeply impacts the families as they move out of shelter into their own spaces. I am grateful that we as an organization have been able to provide access to gift cards for our clients, as well as a food pantry. This allows for us to provide that additional support with food and not add to the financial strain the family may be experiencing.

Working in housing presents its challenges. It can be demanding and stressful. Yet, with each successful placement, I am reminded of the profound impact of this work.



OPERATION SUPERVISOR

-Khaleiha Cunningham

Having transitioned in the role of Operations Supervisor in the fall of 2023, my focus within this role has been the coordination and supervision of daily operational activities within the shelter and assisting with the development and implementation of operational policies and procedures that meet the organization's goals.

I also have the privilege of supervising and leading a dynamic team of operational staff consisting of Household Coordinator-Carlene and Chef Greg, who help streamline and maintain the efficiency of the shelter's operation. On July 10th, we welcomed Chef Greg to our team at Bryony House on a full-time basis. Chef Greg, having ample experience with a variety of international cuisines including French, Asian, Indian, Fusion and more; has been able to offer an expanded meal service for clients of Bryony House. A highly skilled baker, his freshly baked goods are frequently requested by clients young and old. Under the guidance of Chef Greg and our household coordinator Carlene we have also introduced culinary showcases within the shelter allowing clients the opportunity to prepare meals for fellow residents.

Through support of our Household Coordinator, we have created a stronger and more comprehensive approach to supporting our clients well being by meeting their housing needs and providing daily necessities as they navigate life within the shelter. With a holistic approach to shelter adaptation, in partnership with IKEA we were able to remodel both our Quiet and Meditation spaces creating a safe space and place of solace for women and children.

With a focus on community building both internally and externally and through generous donations and volunteer assistance, we have also been able to implement a client outreach food pantry, and maintain the organization of the building. A special thank you is extended to all donors and volunteers of Bryony House!

We are so appreciative of Chef Greg and Carlene for their contributions to Bryony House thus far and look forward to a great new fiscal year.

We will continue to foster professional development within our organization and prioritize employee well-being.

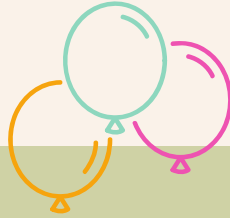
